
From the minister's Desk

The United Reformed Church is embarking on a time of thinking and praying around the theme "Walking the Way: Living the life of Jesus today."

It's a theme worth considering for Christians because at our baptism, in St. Pauls words, we "Put on Christ" (Romans 13), we are to die to self and be

alive in Christ (Romans 6), we are "ambassadors for Christ." (2 Corinthians 5:20). The metaphors go on and on but they all convey this thought. Paul assures his readers that Spirit of Christ is alive in them. He urges us

St Paul urges us to be like Christ whose spirit is in us.



This fits really well with our current set of themes, running through each month, of being stewards of God's resources. In the parable of the faithful and unfaithful stewards, Jesus implies that if we are trustworthy in small things, God will entrust us with greater things. (Matthew Chapter 25) As Faith Paulding's article spells out, in September we are looking at being stewards of justice. But we need to think very carefully what that means.

Justice, for Jesus, isn't the same as justice in popular thinking.

In popular thinking, justice is tit-for-tat, or a fair go, or just desserts. Justice, Jesus' way, is a driving compassion and care that wants only one thing, that we will be freed from all the things that destroy and kill the heart and soul, and restored to what God wants us to be like. So that passion is not about tit-for-tat at all. It goes way beyond what's fair. It prays for the people doing the crucifying. It loves the enemy. It does good to those who do evil. It wants salvation, or wholeness, or healing, or all three, however you interpret them, for all of God's creation and it is passionate about it. That's God's justice. It's coming from a very different place to common folk-lore justice, or legal justice, or the kind of "justice" that's about revenge and payback or penalty.

So, how are you going being a steward of that kind of justice? It's a tough call and it takes the impetus and passion of Christ's Spirit. I do hope that's real for us all. If it is, we'll be making a difference.

The URC have sent us some prayers, and I'd like you to have access to October's prayers so I've put them into Contact in our Prayer Diary. *I hope you can use each week's focus to shape and direct your own prayers.*

STEWARDS OF GOD'S RESOURCES - Peace

Stewardship is about the relationship between Christian living and Christian giving.

God gives peace such as the world cannot give. Our response is to be active peacemakers.

The Christian vocation of peacemaking is a crucial part of faithfully following Christ and a vital contribution the church makes to the earthly peace that is a basic human necessity for all people and nations.

Peacemaking is not just about avoiding wars. Conflict begins on a small scale: within families, between neighbours, in churches, in schools and workplaces, among local religious and ethnic groups. They frequently arise from injustices within such relationships, and for this reason addressing injustice is a key component of peacemaking. The lives of Christians should be distinctive in working to establish just and peaceful relationships between those among whom they live and work. This will not be a life free from conflict: conflict is an inescapable feature of human living and can often be unavoidable to bring necessary change. Peacemaking does not mean passivity, or acquiescing to injustice: it means being active in creating and maintaining right relationships. It means day to day care to deal rightly and considerately with a child, or parent, or sibling, or spouse, or friend. It means not joining factions within churches but finding a common ground on which differences can be discussed, and working for understanding in differences within and between denominations. On a larger scale, peacemaking means engaging in political campaigns and debates in support of policies that offer a realistic alternative to vicious cycles of hostility and fear. It means working internationally to combat economic and social threats to peace, such as poverty, infectious disease and environmental degradation. On a small scale of individual relationships, through to the large scale of relationships between nations, most people are able to live in peace with one another most of the time. The sustaining of such relationships is a basic part of Christian peacemaking.

Fostering peaceful relationships also has an environmental dimension. Individual Christians and churches can work to limit their ecological footprint through careful use of energy and care of buildings as well as with their use of transport. Issues of environmental concern and of global injustice go hand in hand.

There are times when the strength of relationships is not adequate for the pressures they are subjected to, and individuals or communities become locked in conflict. There is then a second task of peacemaking: that of acting to resolve conflicts. In this context some forms of conflict are a necessary stage to a just peace; this task of peacemaking may be on a small scale or a large scale. It may take the shape of overcoming hurt in order to initiate reconciliation with a close family member, or it may be represented in UN sponsored intergovernmental talks over a border dispute. It requires particular skills: patience in listening to the concerns of different parties, creativity in finding ways to enable the challenging 'truth-telling' that allows groups to acknowledge the suffering of others, wisdom in devising possible resolutions that promise benefits to each side.

Alongside attempts to resolve conflicts, there may be a need to take measures to prevent the conflict expressing itself in violence, or preventing an existing violent conflict from widening or intensifying. Here the peacemaking task is that of physically separating opposing parties, and taking steps to maintain law and order.

Peaceful living in the midst of a violent world is possible only in the hope that the realization of peace between the nations is in God's hands. When Jesus Christ confronted the political and religious powers of his day, he rode on a donkey on fulfilment of the prophecy of Zechariah that a new king would come who was 'righteous and having salvation, gentle and riding on a donkey', who would proclaim peace to the nations, and whose rule would extend from 'sea to sea, from the river to the ends of the earth' (Zechariah 9:9-10, Matthew 21:5).

- **Wednesday** God of all knowledge, we realise that, while some hit the headlines, many who need our prayers are simply unnamed and forgotten. Hear our particular prayers for victims of extremism in those parts of the world that seem to be more readily ignored. Amen.
- Thursday God of love, forgive us our culture of blame. Forgive us our unreasonable phobias. Hear our prayers for those who get blamed for something they would never do and in which they wish no part. Amen.
- **Friday** God of justice, help us to recognise the causes of extremism, both those that are justified and those that are not and help us to work for a world in which peace and justice are properly valued and human beings respect each other as they should. Amen.

Tuesday October 31st: Challenging relationships

W Never pay back evil for evil to anyone. Do things in such a way that everyone can see you are honourable Romans 12:17

A Consider people and situations that have caused you anguish and restlessness, during your days and nights; or are you a challenge to people?

What does it feel like to be at odds with someone? Can you hear God speaking?

What comes to mind? Is it how you feel, or are your thoughts with the other person and how they are feeling?

Working through challenging and difficult relations, takes patience and forgiveness, and even though we may need to challenge a person or situation, we are called to be peacemakers. Use the tree template, and focus on the second branch, and add more leaves and bring before God people and situations.

The Church Sets Out – The Early Years

(An extract from 'A History of Sawston Congregational Church' by Richard Ball published by Crampton and Sons in 1947)

We are unable to gather precise details of the state of religion in Sawston in the period prior to the year 1810. For several years preachers from neighbouring districts held monthly services in the parish, but their labours did not meet with any distinctive success. A desire for weekly meetings was expressed by a few friends, and these meetings aroused a deeper interest "the spirit of hearing was improved".

A place of meeting was not as yet within the plan of the preachers, but a few local stalwarts found a barn situated in Common Lane where friends could meet for worship and edification. This barn, which measured 51ft x 16ft cannot be described exactly as a lordly place, nor the approach to it considered as a stately avenue, but here indeed was the King's highway, and although a common lane, those who trod its paths were filled with the spirit of faith. On September 30th, 1810, the barn was formally dedicated to its noble purposes and many souls were gathered into the divine storehouse as a result of the labours of the faithful. It soon became evident that the building was too small to seat all who desired to attend, many being unable to gain admittance, and after prayerful consideration it was decided to erect a suitable house of prayer.

A piece of ground was given by a friend named Brown, and the brick building which is now named the Lecture Hall was built. In addition to the seats on the ground floor, a gallery was placed at one end, at the rear there was a vestry.

The erection of the Lecture Hall was met with "the greatest opposition imaginable", but the faithful did not tarry; nothing daunted they went on with the good work.

The building work started in 1811 and March 22, 1812, the church was opened and dedicated to its high and great task of making known the crown rights of the Redeemer.

Shortly after the opening services the friends invited Mr Herbert Tyler, a student of Homerton College, London (close associations with Homerton, Cambridge) to become its student pastor. At the end of his 4 months service he was invited to the full pastorate, which he accepted.

Mr Tyler continued until July 24th, 1814. During his short ministry he welcomed several friends into fellowship, the membership increasing to 26.

At that time, friends who were associated with the Duxford Church but lived in Sawston or Pampisford, came into active and full membership with Sawston Church.

Upon his resignation, Mr Joseph Irons accepted as his successor and remained pastor until July 1818. During his ministry, certain names appear for the first time on the church roll and these names became familiar in Sawston: Thomas and Elizabeth Challis, William Churchman, John Wakefield and Charles Adcock. The membership rose to over 40.

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
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
